## Masako's Column

### **Multicultural Victoria- Ballarat**

**Question 1: Do you know how many people came to live in Ballarat from overseas in the last 9 years from 2002-2010?**

I found an interesting article from The Courier, 15<sup>th</sup> July 2002. The title of the article was "Culture Shock: Ballarat becomes even less multicultural". The BRMC chairman of that time, Dr. Sundram Sivamalai said: "We need to become ... newcomer friendly". Indeed.

In 2010, I believe our City of Ballarat is not the same place anymore. For me, it is fascinating to see different cultural settings and environment, depending on where you live. Before I moved into Ballarat, I used to live in 10 different suburbs in Melbourne. I had "Culture shock" at every place. There was something slightly and/ or significantly different in each suburb.

With the following facts, it explains a lot.

The State of Victoria has been enriched by the presence of people from all over the world. 23.8% of Victoria's population were born overseas.

1. 43.69% of Victorians were either born overseas, or have a parent who was born overseas.
2. Victorians come from more than 200 countries, speak more than 230 languages and dialects and follow more than 120 religious faiths.
3. Most of the overseas-born Victorians came to Australia as migrants hoping to find a better life for themselves and their children.

According to the 3rd point, 'a better life for their children', this is important for all of us in our society. They are our future. Do we, as a community, provide the best educational support for our coming generation? I now would like to talk about parental support.

**Question 2: Are you parents? Do you send your children to Primary School? If you are new to the schooling system in Australia, is everything clear?**

I would like to introduce valuable information from “Welcome to Primary School: A Parent’s Guide to Victorian Government Primary Schools”. There is English version as well as four other languages available: Arabic, Chinese, Turkish and Vietnamese.
